

## Lighting of the candles

Candles have long been a symbol of prayer, remembrance and hope. Today we light candles to remember those who have suffered a loss, to express our unity in prayer and spirit with all in need, to remember the promise and hope of God who brings light out of darkness, and hope out of despair.

### The first candle: For those who work for the ambulance service

Let us pray for all ambulance staff who play a part in providing care for others.

We pray for all those who work for the country's ambulance services, those who work behind the scenes in whatever way, the directors and managers, the administrative staff, the mechanics, the vehicle and station cleaners, all playing their part in ensuring that the emergency face of the service is able to treat the vulnerable and sick.

Those who daily care for others in every increasing times of demand, the call takers and dispatchers, the paramedics, technicians, care assistants.

We pray for the wider unseen family of the ambulance services; the husbands, wives, partners and children all who play in a part in supporting their loved ones in the tough strains placed upon the emergency services. "The Lord upholds all who fall; the Lord lifts up those who are bowed down." (Psalm 145)

"The spirit of the Lord God is upon me, because the Lord has anointed me to bind up the broken hearted." (Isaiah 61)

#### All: O God, you bring healing and wholeness to a broken world. Be with those who serve in the vocation of healing. Amen.

#### The second candle: For those serving in the rescue and care for others

Let us pray for all who serve to help those who are in need and for those who daily place themselves in harm's way to rescue and care for others.

"I lift up my eyes to the hills; from where is my help to come? My help comes from the Lord, the maker of heaven and earth." (Psalm 121)

All: O God, our defender, we remember with thanksgiving all who willingly go to rescue and care for those in peril, and all who continue to offer themselves in service for the care of others. Grant them strength and courage as they continue to serve. Amen.

### The third candle: The light of hope that shines in the darkness

Let us pray for all who are in despair, those who are suffering in silence afraid to call out for fear of ridicule. We pray that they might know the light and hope of God.

"The Lord will be your everlasting light, and your days of mourning shall be ended." (Isaiah 60)

"For surely I know the plans I have for you, says the Lord, plans for your welfare and not for harm, to give you a future with hope." (Jeremiah 29)

All: We offer up to you O God those who are suffering. May they know that there are people who can help, who can listen and who are there for them just as you are there for us all. Amen.

### The fourth candle: For those who have lost loved ones

Let us pray for all who have lost family members, colleagues and friends.

"Though I walk through the shadow of death, I will fear no evil, for Thou art with me. Thy rod and thy staff, they comfort me." (Psalm 23)

All: O God, we pray for the families and friends of those who grieve and those who still recall with sadness the loss of a colleague and a friend. Grant them the light of your comfort and presence. Amen.

# Hymn - Abide with me

### By Henry Francis Lyte, 1793 - 1847

Abide with me; fast falls the eventide; The darkness deepens; Lord, with me abide; When other helpers fail and comforts flee, Help of the helpless, oh, abide with me.

Swift to its close ebbs out life's little day; Earth's joys grow dim, its glories pass away; Change and decay in all around I see -O Thou who changest not, abide with me.

I need Thy presence every passing hour; What but Thy grace can foil the tempter's pow'r? Who, like Thyself, my guide and stay can be? Through cloud and sunshine, Lord, abide with me.

Hear our prayer for the ambulance services of this nation. Bless the administrators and managers, as they strive to make important decisions that will effect those who serve under them.

Bless the control officers and assistants as they deal with the requests for help from the general public and hospital services. Bless the emergency staff who bring care, relief and comfort to those in their hour of need.

Bless the patient care staff as they transport the informed and needy to hospital appointments. Keep all members of the ambulance services safe in their duties, wise in their decisions, compassionate in their actions and grant in serving others they may know that they are serving you; you who bring wholeness to all your children. Amen. Concluding by all saying The Lord's Prayer:

Our Father, which art in heaven, Hallowed be thy Name.

Thy Kingdom come. Thy will be done in earth, As it is in heaven.

Give us this day our daily bread. And forgive us our trespasses, As we forgive them that trespass against us.

> And lead us not into temptation, But deliver us from evil.

> > For thine is the kingdom, The power, and the glory, For ever and ever. Amen.
